Exams

IN MY WORDS with Ella Moloney



On the 8th of December 2005 at Warrnambool Base Hospital, my parents Jane and Leon Moloney welcomed a little girl Ella Jane at 4:02 pm, I was their firstborn and definitely their favourite child.

I thought my life was perfect with just me, Mum and Dad, but our family didn't stop there. A year and 11 days to be exact, my sister Chloe was born, which was probably the worst day of my life according to my Mum and Dad as I stopped talking and didn't speak until I was about 7, which caused a few problems so I had to go through a few years of speech therapy. Then 15 months later, Darcy (my partner in crime) came along and another 15 months later Millie was born, this was supposed to be our family until Millie ventured into school, where Mum wanted 2 more to complete the family. But Mum is probably glad that didn't happen because I'm surprised she can deal with us 4, as we are a bit of a handful sometimes, sorry mum! And I am not sure the world could deal with 6 of us.

We grew up on a dairy farm with 210 acres, plus many out-paddocks of 80 acres each, in a tiny town called Boorcan just a few minutes out of Terang. I started my education at Camperdown Preschool when I was 3, and when I was 4 I moved to Terang Kindergarten. My primary school journey began at St Thomas' Primary School in Terang where I was until the end of Year 3. My Dad was a dairy farmer and my Mum had her own hairdressing business at our home, but my Dad then started studying teaching and finished his course and was offered a job in Stawell. At the start of 2015, we moved to Stawell and I finished primary school at St. Pats in Stawell. I started at Marian in 2018 where I met so many amazing people.

Some of my favourite memories include our annual camping trip to Warrnambool over Christmas for 4 weeks, every year this is the number 1 thing I can't wait for, and when it's over I want to be straight back there. And the rest of my favourite memories are from living on the farm and having so much land to go play, although our favourite place to play was over the fence into the neighbour's bush. We all used to climb up our tree over the trampoline and jump down 3-4 metres onto the trampoline, and for some reason we never injured ourselves. We had a massive cubby house where I one day decided to push Chloe off and she broke her arm, sorry Chloe. I could write for ages about all my memories but I'll leave it here.



I have done every sport possible growing up but have only stuck with 2; netball and cricket. I started NetSetGO when I was little and did it for a few years but it got too hard with my parents having full-time jobs. My first year of playing competitive netball was in 2018 at Great Western, where I picked it up very quickly and there was no stopping me. I have played at Great Western since and I have had many opportunities through netball that I am very grateful for. The same year I started cricket where for the first couple of years I played for Swift's Great Western. Then a girl's competition started in Horsham, so I joined that league, and have played there since. Through cricket, I've had many opportunities, such as representing the league in the Western Girls Shield multiple times, but the part I'm most grateful for is all the friendships I have formed through the competition.

When I leave school, like everyone, I would love to travel. Junior Scholarships Grampians Soaring Club



The Grampians Soaring Club is offering 6 junior scholarships in 2023 to students in the surrounding district. The scholarship is designed to help students on their journey towards becoming a pilot and is aimed at year 10 students, but other year levels may be considered.

The club has a team of qualified instructors who run the lessons during weekends (in appropriate weather) to take you from complete novice to becoming a solo pilot. Gliding is a safe, exciting and cost effective way of learning to fly, and your gliding hours even count as credit towards powered flying in the future.

Our gliders are extremely well maintained by qualified mechanics and our training craft are robustly built specially for instructing, long distance cross country flying, high altitude flying and even aerobatics!

SCHOLARSHIP DETAILS - The Scholarship Covers the costs of:

- Annual Membership to the club
- Membership to the Gliding Federation Australia (which includes your insurance)
- 1st trial flight for free
- Apply by 31 May 2024, informed if successful by 7 June 2024.
- Year 10 applicants prioritised, but all applicants considered.

ONGOING COSTS

- Club Glider hire costs are Free before midday and only 0.65c per minute after midday
- Launch costs are \$15 per launch (winch) or \$7 per minute aerotow (behind the plane)

Typical cost examples:

- Standard 10 minute lesson before midday (winch launch): \$15
- Standard 10 minute lesson afternoon (winch launch): \$21.50
- 20 minute lesson before midday (7 minute aerotow launch): \$49
- 20 minute lesson after midday (7 minute aerotow launch): \$62

The Process

Applying for this scholarship does not commit you. Successful applicants will then be invited to attend their free trial flight to confirm their suitability for flight training and also to ensure that the student enjoys it and wants to continue. If both the club instructor and the student wish to proceed, the club joining application will be completed and the student will begin their flight training journey! *Students who are unsuccessful may still apply for the scholarship the following year, or alternatively are welcome to join the club through the normal process to start their flight training.
