

IN MY WORDS with Eden McKiernan

Ahh yes, the night I was born, November 11 2004, a spectacular night where the happiness of my parents, Troy and Rebecca, was significantly increased thanks to my presence in the world. Lucky for me, I was born second child of the family. With my sister Phoebe coming first, I got to avoid all eldest sibling responsibilities which made my childhood quite enjoyable, I think.

I began kindergarten in Geelong. It was located just across the road from my future school, Covenant College, the school I would soon attend after I had fully mastered the art of painting with my hands and building sandcastles. But this would not be the only school I was to become acquainted with. In Grade 2, after my family moved out of our first house in Highton to a place 12 minutes down the road, I transferred to Manifold Heights Primary School where I completed Grades 3 and 4. During this time, my younger sister Stephanie was born, and my poor father, became increasingly outnumbered in the family. Lucky for him, the family was blessed with my darling little brother, Samuel.





After completing Grade 3, my family moved to France for a couple of months because, why not, and upon arriving we were welcomed with sidewalks that were half an inch wide. Single file through Paris, we made it to our country house where we happily enjoyed the outdoor games room, and completely avoided the backyard pool because, who wants to swim in minus degrees. Whilst in France we met a lovely couple, Allen and Jean, who frequently took the family to weekend farmers markets where I put my heart and soul into finding DS games for the DS I had as a kid, completely ignoring anything of actual quality or cultural significance. Phoebe and I did attend a primary school whilst we were in France, which was fabulous because there was only one kid who spoke English, and I completely failed to learn any of the language, but we did get Wednesdays off, and they served lunch at the school, so it was fine. At one point we did attend a family friends luncheon where we were offered the French delicacy, escargot (snails), to which I had to politely decline. The pastries they had in France were absolutely mouthwatering and I would definitely go out of my way to travel back just for their food. It's safe to say the highlight of my trip was definitely experiencing the culture and not learning the language, apparently, because being the studious eight year old I was, I learnt a grand total of not very many French words.

When we got back from France, our family moved from Geelong up to Sunbury, where I began to travel down almost daily to Geelong continuing my attendance at Manifold Primary, completing Grade 4. After Grade 4 the family moved to Riddells Creek where I completed Grade 5 at the local primary school. I honestly don't remember much about this time but I do remember I used to play one of my favourite games as child, British Bulldogs, with my friends during recess and lunch. We weren't actually allowed to tackle though so we hid behind one of the hills at the back of the school and played, pretending that we were only playing tag whenever a yard duty teacher would walk by. It was after my time at Riddells Creek Primary that my family then moved again to Tasmania where we lived for two months in an Eco village, and one of the locals was growing a banana tree in his greenhouse which I thought was pretty cool. After two months in tents, we moved back to the mainland and moved to Kinglake where I was homeschooled through Grades 6, 7 and a little bit of Year 8. We stayed in Kinglake for approximately 6 months and did not much before moving once again to the house we are in now, in Skipton. We have been here for a few years now, and have almost completed building our new house in Beaufort, twenty minutes up the road, which my parents are determined to make the last and final place they move to.

Upon moving to Skipton, I enrolled into Marian College, starting in the last half of Year 8. I believe this is the longest time I have spent at one school as I am now surviving my final year of

College. During my time at Marian, I am grateful to have made friends with so many new people, and have been blessed with the company of my closest friends Lilly, Louise, Georgia and Liam who have kept me sane throughout VCE and graciously put up with all my unique qualities and annoying talents.

I know, the thank yous is often the most boring part, but I really do need to say thank you to some people. So thank you to my parents who have raised me into the person I am today, you have done an excellent job. To my teachers who have put time and effort into providing me with an education and for being patient when it's taken a while for me to understand certain concepts. To my siblings for... actually no never mind... I'm kidding, all three of you have brought me much joy so thank you. To my friends and peers who have contributed to my growth as a person and provided me with many moments of happiness and laughter. And I would also like to thank God, even when I'm struggling with some difficult questions that don't seem to have answers, he is patient with me and he still loves me.


