Returning to School

I have received notice from a number of staff and families within the school community compromised by the COVID illness and isolation requirements over the holiday period. I wish the very best to those who are unwell for a speedy recovery.

I understand there may be some nervousness around the return of all students. Please know that based on the latest government regulations and advice, we have been working hard on our COVID safety plan in preparation for school return. There is extensive information within this correspondence, based on the Operational Guide of the Catholic Education Commission of Victoria (CECV) in collaboration with the Department of Education. We will continue to keep you updated over the days and weeks as we adjust and combat this wave to the best of our ability. The safety of your child/young people, staff and families remain our highest priority. Please see comprehensive details in this newsletter regarding Rapid Antigen tests, isolation, and support. If your child is unwell please keep them home.

Teacher Advisor Groups and Class Groups

Every few years because of changes in numbers, staff retirement, the need for greater balance across the various year levels, or balance of gender or needs we must adjust some of the Teacher Advisor groups. This was necessary for 2022. Where possible in the placement of each child we have taken into consideration support and friendships for your child. Very early in the school year your child's Teacher Advisor will make contact with you to introduce themself and open lines of communication.

Similarly, class lists were released on Friday. Many hours are devoted to finding the right combinations and supports for all students to provide the best conditions conducive to high levels of learning for all. Sometimes students may feel disappointed because they are not in class with all their friends. The timetable is a complex system. Students will often be together in some classes but perhaps not all core subjects and electives. Please know that our decisions are based on the best information available about knowing the students we teach and how they learn best. It also relies upon allocation of resources including Learning Support Staff to the areas of highest learning needs. However, we know we are not perfect and an oversight may have occurred or limitations may have prevented our first choice. If you have any concerns with class allocations please contact Ms Stephanie Saravanja as the Head of Wellbeing.

For Subject allocations please contact (Year 9 and 10) Mr Summers (Year 11 and 12) Mrs Edwards. All Years 7 and 8 students complete the same subjects and electives.

Welcome to Our New Staff

A very warm welcome to a number of staff new to the Marian Community. We wish them well as they join our wonderful community and begin to work closely with the students to continue our improvement journey. Building Works.

Work on the heritage building is almost complete with fences expected to go down in the new week or so. This has been a significant undertaking to replace the essential structural supports on the now 134 year old building. With the front and back verandahs now reinforced, we continue to enjoy the beauty and hard work by many generations of Sisters, staff and parents who dedicated time, effort and resources to create the Marian story.

Rapid Antigen Testing (Based on the Operational Guide CECV)

"Free rapid antigen tests will be made available for all staff and students in Victorian schools for the first four weeks of Term 1 2022. Rapid antigen testing will be **voluntary** for all primary, secondary and specialist school students and staff. We hope that families will take up this opportunity to secure the safety of each member of our school community.

Rapid antigen test kits will be distributed directly to schools for the commencement of Term 1 2022. The school will inform you as soon as tests are available and how we intend to distribute them".

Tests will be provided in packs of five individual tests. Students will be given one pack on their first day at school and one pack at the start of week three. Students will be requested to not open tests and to take them directly home to their parents at the end of the school day. Students are requested to test twice weekly on school days (we recommend prior to school on Monday and Thursday mornings). Obviously this week will need to be a little different with Year 7s and 12s testing prior to school on Wednesday morning and Year 8s to 11s testing prior to school on Thursday.

Advice for Positive Cases

If staff or students receive a positive test result at any time, they must report this through the Department of Health system (<u>Rapid antigen tests | Coronavirus</u> <u>Victoria</u>) or via the coronavirus hotline on 1800 675 398.

<u>Students</u> who report a positive result must isolate for seven days and not attend school during that period. 3 Staff and students **must not return to school** while they remain symptomatic, unless it is known that their symptoms are caused by an underlying health condition or medication.

As principal I will notify the school community through email or message when a student or staff member has (or multiple students or staff members) have returned a positive COVID-19 test result and have attended the school or school activities. The notification will protect the privacy of the individual but will include:

- Dates of attendance
- Affected group/cohort/year levels
- Any relevant extracurricular activities undertaken

The notification may be provided to only the affected group/cohort/ year level or we may notify the whole school community depending on the circumstances and the risks.

Students or their parents must also report a positive result to their school. Please phone the front office immediately or as soon as possible; this is so the school can support your child, record that they will be absent while in 7-day isolation, and let the rest of the school community know there has been a positive case onsite and that they should monitor for symptoms.

Advice for Positive Cases

All students and staff who return a positive result from a rapid antigen test should also follow the latest government health advice at <u>https://www.coronavirus.vic.gov.au/rapid-antigen-tests</u>.

Information about how to do a test, including a how-to video translated into 33 languages, is available <u>online</u>.

Household Contact

Where a <u>student</u> is a household contact of a positive case (that is, they have spent more than four hours with someone who has COVID-19 inside a house, accommodation, or care facility) they must inform the school and isolate for seven days and not attend school during that period.

Students who are required to isolate or quarantine will be supported by the school in the same way as students with an extended absence due to illness or injury, with learning materials provided. The level of support will depend on the capacity of the school to support continued learning and the number of staff available to do so. Our school is not able to provide a full remote learning program in these circumstances.

Year 12 Retreat

All Year 12 students will be asked to complete a Rapid Antigen test on Tuesday nights (or Wednesday morning at the latest) prior to stepping on the bus for the Retreat at Camp Hill. Working with the camp, staff and students have been spread across the accommodation areas to minimize numbers. This is an important event in the development of our new Year 12 cohort as they develop as a strong team.

Year 7 Camp

Unfortunately, we have received advice that the Year 7 camp at Lorne must be postponed until the week of February 28. Again, this is an excellent camp for building community among the new students. Details about the new arrangements will be forwarded to parents by Mrs Rhonda North.

Consumer fact sheet



This fact sheet explains how to use and interpret the results from COVID-19 home use tests (also known as COVID-19 rapid antigen self-tests).

What is a COVID-19 home use test (rapid antigen self-test)?

Home use tests for COVID-19 test a nasal swab, saliva, or oral fluid sample for the presence of the virus that causes COVID-19.

Home use tests can be used anywhere, including at home or work. They can be used without the involvement of a doctor or health professional. Most tests produce a result within 10-20 minutes.

When should I use the test?

The tests are more reliable when used by a person with COVID-19 symptoms, and less reliable when used by a person without symptoms. IMPORTANT: Home use tests are not as accurate as tests done in the laboratory (called PCR tests).

Where can I get a test?

Home use tests are available from pharmacies, supermarkets, retail outlets and online.

Only tests approved by the Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) are legally permitted to be sold in Australia. The TGA

website has a list of all the approved home use tests, along with a copy of the manufacturer's instructions for each test.

How do I use the test?

Many home use tests are available and each one is different. It is important to follow the steps in the instructions provided with the test you use.

Not using the test properly may produce an incorrect result.

All tests are for single use only which means you can only use each test ONCE and then it must be thrown away. Do not ever use a test more than once or attempt to use one test on different people.

Wash your hands after completing the test and disposing of the test kit contents.

What do the test results look like?

Most results will be displayed in a window on the device. The instructions provided with the test will explain what the result means. For example the results could look like this:

A second line even if faint is a positive result

What do I do if I get a positive result?

If you get a positive result it is recommended that you stay at home. Check the information provided by your <u>state or</u> <u>territory health department</u> to find out what you need to do. This includes whether you need to report your result and quarantine requirements. If you are unwell you should seek medical assistance.

What do I do if I get a negative result?

If you get a negative result it is less likely that you have COVID-19, but continue to follow all public health advice on limiting the spread of the virus.

If you feel unwell or have symptoms you should get a PCR test as soon as possible.

What do I do if I get an 'invalid' result?

Home use tests may produce an 'invalid' result, which means it has not worked correctly. If this happens, you should throw it away and do another home use test, or if you are unwell and have symptoms, get a PCR test at a testing site.

How regularly should I use home use tests?

This will depend on the recommendations and requirements of the state or territory you live in. Check your <u>state or territory</u> Health Departments website for information.

Can home use tests be used for children?

Tests on children should always be done or supervised by an adult. See the instructions provided with the test for any safety instructions for using the test on a child.

How do I dispose of a home use test?

This will vary according to information provided with the tests. Some tests come with a plastic bag to place the contents of the test into (including the swab). This bag is then placed into another bag for disposal with your household rubbish.

If no bags are provided you can place the used items from the test into a small plastic bag that can be sealed. This bag should be put into another bag that can be sealed and disposed of with your household rubbish.

Wash your hands carefully after completing the test and disposing of the test kit contents.

Other things to consider

What are the concerns with home use tests and are they accurate?

Home use tests are not as accurate as PCR tests, but they are very helpful because they provide results quickly. They can also pick up the COVID-19 virus very early in the infection, sometimes before you have symptoms.

Where there are low rates of COVID-19, the tests are less accurate as there is a higher risk of both false positive and false negative results.

Do the recommendations vary between jurisdictions?

The use of different types of COVID-19 tests and what you're required to do if you get a positive result may vary in each state and territory. <u>Further information</u> is available on their websites.

Reporting problems

If there is a problem with the test, you should report it to the supplier or sponsor. You should be able to see the sponsor contact details on the label.





BUSHFIRE PREPAREDNESS INFORMATION

As we enter the bushfire season for another year it is important that the guidelines regarding school arrangements for CODE RED days, Total Fire Ban days and bushfire alerts are clearly articulated to all parents. These are as follows:

1. **No** school buses will run on any days that are declared CODE RED to Marian College. This includes the Halls Gap, Pomonal, Moyston, Amphitheatre, Elmhurst, Buangor, Beaufort, Concongella, Stawell, Navarre, Landsborough, Maroona and Willaura routes. All of these buses run through areas that are on the **At Risk Register**, and as such, are unable to transport students on CODE RED days because of the high potential of bush fires.

2. On CODE RED days, parents are asked to ensure students who are remaining at home because their bus is not running are **never** left at home unattended or in the care of older children.

3. Marian College has not been identified as being at high fire risk, and as such it will remain <u>OPEN</u> on a CODE RED day unless it is directly threatened by fire.


4. If a fire starts during the day that affects a bus route home, the College will be notified by the bus Coordinators at either Stawell or Ararat College. It may be possible that students are not permitted to travel home on the bus in such a situation. Parents will be notified if this occurs, and students will be cared for at school until transportation home can be arranged.

5. While our school has not been identified as being at high fire risk, we do plan offsite activities – such as camps and field trips – during the fire season. If such activities are considered to be at risk from fire, or occur on a Total Fire Ban day-they will be rescheduled or cancelled.

6. If your child is old enough, talk to them about bushfires and your family's bushfire survival plan – particularly if you are planning day trips or holidays to fire-prone areas.

Please feel free to contact the College if you require further advice or information.
