Bullying and Harassment

In this Year of Courage, it is important that students understand their role in ensuring Marian College remains a safe place for all students. Courage is acting and Speaking with integrity. It is doing the right thing regardless of who may be involved. It is speaking out for those who have no voice. This week I spoke to all students from Years 7, Year 8 and Year 9 regarding the values of our College, focused especially on **Hospitality** and our ability to ensure all are welcome and

Block or shut down communications. Let a parent or school staff know there is an issue. For any face-to-face concerns, students should complete an Incident Report in the RTC. All Incident Reports are followed up by House Leaders or the Leadership Team.

For parents, we ask that you let your child's Teacher Advisor know if your son or daughter is experiencing difficulty and their attempt to address the matter has not solved the problem. YEAR 8 GEOLOGY EXCURSION

The STEM Hub at Marian College is committed to developing connections with our local community and bringing the concepts learned in class into the real world. Recently our Year 7's enjoyed a visit from Jackie Bondell from the ARC centre of excellence for Dark Matter Particle Physics. She introduced our students to the science of dark matter and engaged them with science enquiry activities.

This week was the Year 8's turn to connect with our local environment. In class we have been learning about rock types, how they are formed and the minerals we find in them. We live in an area with a rich mining history and are incredibly fortunate to have experts in the field, locally, to share their knowledge and skills with our students. Mr Wess Edgar, Chief Geologist with Agnico Eagle Australia, very generously gave us his time over three days to teach our students about our local landforms and how they were created. He showcased his extensive collection of rocks and students discovered fascinating properties such as magnetism, colour and crystals and applied their understanding of how they are formed to explain these properties.

The highlight of the day was gold panning. Despite the terrible weather, students were eager to strike it rich, all the while developing a deeper knowledge of scientific concepts by engaging in hands-on immersive activities.

We wish to thank Wess for sharing his knowledge and enthusiasm with our students.

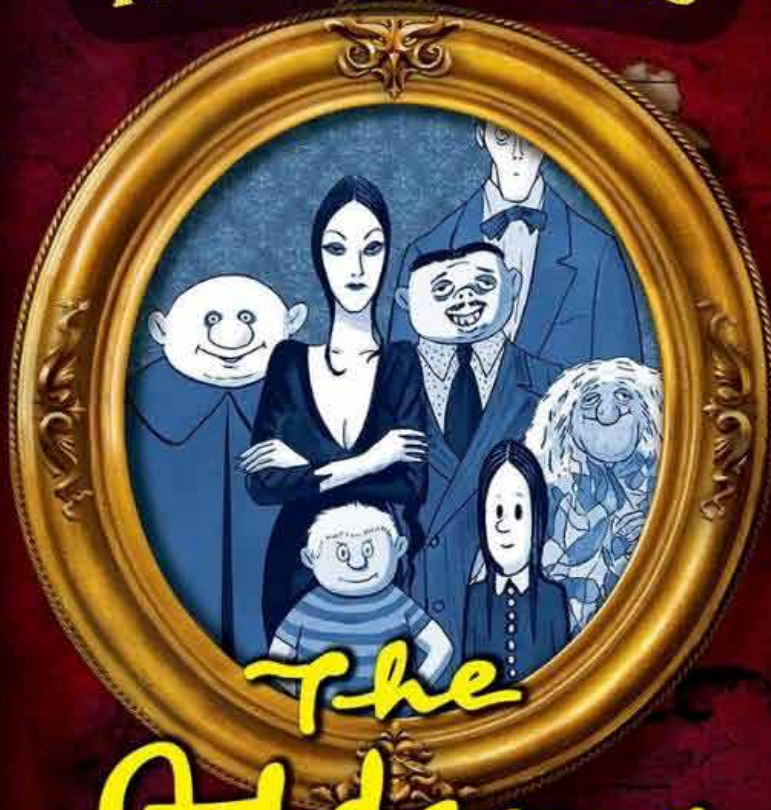

YEAR 12 STUDENTS

CONSIDERING TERTIARY STUDY?

If you're in Year 12 and are keen to apply for university and/or TAFE courses, this is an exciting time! You can apply for courses to start in 2024 and for most courses, you can defer your offer until 2025. There are three ways you can apply for courses.



Tertiary Admission Centres (TACs)

Each state and territory (except for Tasmania) use TACs for tertiary applications. In Victoria, you must apply for all universities through VTAC (except for CQUniversity). Applications for NSW and Canberra courses are open via UAC, and applications for Victorian courses will open on Monday 31 July. Other states will open early August.



Direct entry

Some universities allow students to apply direct to them external to tertiary admission centres in each state. Direct entry is usually tied in with early entry programs. Applications for the majority of universities that accept direct entries are now open.



Early entry

Universities can take into consideration more than just your ATAR. Such as:

- Year 11 results
- community service
- a recommendation from your school
- hardship (e.g., rural, financial).

Applications for early entry programs at most universities are now open.

COMPULSORY UNIVERSITY ENTRY TESTS

Law at the University of NSW (UNSW)

Students planning to apply for undergraduate law courses at UNSW will need to sit the Law Admissions Test (LAT). The test will be held on Thursday 28 September and results are valid for two years. Registrations for the test close Friday 11 August, <https://careernews.click/unswlat>

Initial teacher education - Victoria

Students planning to apply for initial teacher education courses in Victoria for the 2024 intake are required to sit the Casper test. Casper is an online, open-response situational judgment test (SJT). It asks what you would do in a tough situation, and more importantly, why. This helps determine behavioural tendencies of applicants pursuing people-centred professions.

Students will be required to sit the following test: CSP 10409 – Australian Undergraduate Teacher Education. During the registration process, you will select the universities you would like your results sent to. You will need to create a VTAC account before you can register for the test. VTAC opens on Monday 31 July 2023. Register for the test via <https://acuityinsights.app/casper/>

BUSINESS CADETSHIP PROGRAM

Interested in pursuing a business career? You may consider applying for a cadetship under the Business Cadetships in Melbourne Program. Cadet placement is in Global Markets and Global Research at UBS, a top-ranking global bank. Business Cadets combine paid work at UBS Melbourne with study at the university of their choice in Melbourne. 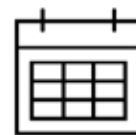

"Career evaluation is constant and unending especially for people who are considering their next career step. Career choices can be difficult as there are so many options out there.

It can be easier if you know which Work Types you prefer and what career options they lead to. These Work Types are identified through a Career Interest Explorer, co-created in consultation with Australian Centre for Career Development and focus on apprenticeship and traineeship career pathways.

There are seven Work Types in total which can lead to different industries and occupations. While it may be easy to choose the best-known occupation in a Work Type, it may not be the best option for you.

Realistically, an occupation can be linked to many Work Types, but focusing on your primary Work Type can help narrow down the industries or occupations that may interest you.





Below are the seven Work Types that are linked to apprenticeship or traineeship occupations. There may be some occupations that you haven't even thought could be done as an apprenticeship or traineeship.

Collection Notice for parents/guardians

2023 Student Residential Address and Other Information

The Australian Government Department of Education (the department) would like to notify you that we have requested for your child's school to provide residential address and other information.

Under the *Australian Education Regulation 2013*, the school is required to provide the department with the following information about each student at the school:

- Names and residential addresses of student's parent(s) and/or guardian(s)
- Student residential address (**excluding student names**)
- Whether the student is a primary or secondary student (education level)
- Whether the student is boarding or a day student (boarding status).

The school collects the above information by generating a **unique and unidentifiable** – student reference number (SRN) for each student record. The school only uses the SRN for this collection. **It is not allowed to be used for any other purpose.** The number only indicates to the department that each record provided is for one student.

Purpose of the collection

The Student Residential Address and Other Information Collection (the Collection) informs Australian Government school education policy and helps ensure funding for non-government schools is based on need.

The information collected will be used to inform school funding calculations. It is combined with Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) data to calculate a non-government school community's capacity to contribute to schooling costs.

From 2020, the department introduced a new measure of capacity to contribute: the Direct Measure of Income (DMI). The DMI is based on the median income of non-government school students' parents or guardians using the Collection data. Use and disclosure of personal information

Your personal information is protected by law under the *Privacy Act 1988* (Cth) (Privacy Act). Personal information is information or an opinion about an identifiable individual. Personal information includes an individual's name and contact details.

Any use or disclosure of your personal information must occur in accordance with Privacy Act and the *Australian Education Act 2013* and *Australian Education Regulation 2013*.

Your personal information provided to the department through the Collection may be:

- disclosed to the ABS for the purposes of capacity to contribute calculations and analysis as a part of the Multi-Agency Data Integration Project (MADIP). Find more information about MADIP on the ABS website [MADIP page](#).
- disclosed to a contracted auditor where the department may from time to time, carry out an audit of a school's collection submission. The contracted auditor compares the school's submission with the school's student enrolment information. The contracted auditor will not use the information for any other purpose.

- disclosed to its service providers for the purposes of providing the department with information and communications technology support services.
- used or disclosed where it is otherwise required or authorised by law.

The department does not intend to disclose your personal information to any overseas recipients.

- how complaints about potential breaches or breaches of the Privacy Act can be made;
- how the department will deal with these complaints.

The department commissioned an independent privacy impact assessment (PIA). The PIA assesses the flows of information under the Collection, compliance with the Privacy Act and measures in place to safeguard the personal information being collected. You are not required to do anything. Your school is responsible for providing the department with the requested details; however, you can contact the school to update your family's details.
