

Perspective - Fred Hyde Day

Perspective is one of the character strengths that most students are familiar with from the Positive Education component of our OAK program (wellbeing). *Perspective* is the ability to see the big picture in life.

I have been reflecting on this a lot lately as we shift in and out of lockdowns and adjust to government regulations and the whims of the Covid virus. We hear a lot about Covid and vaccinations and sport on a daily basis via the media, but what else is happening in our world that needs our attention? Myanmar and Yemen, for example, are places dealing with horrific violence and poverty - people are being killed and people are starving. Those places are not immune from the Covid pandemic. Currently, Afghanistan is being reclaimed by the Taliban, after twenty years of struggle to free the people there from Taliban rule. This means that as we attend school today in relative comfort, girls and women in Afghanistan are prevented from accessing any education, and face brutal and inhumane laws and violence. Being aware of our world and considering others' situations in relation to our own can help us to gain perspective and aid us to 'not sweat the small stuff' in our day.

This Friday, Fred Hyde Day, is an opportunity for us to do just that: to think about people in our world, consider their circumstances, and to act with compassion. On Fred Hyde Day, we will be raising funds for our Kinder on Bhola Island. Bangladesh. This is one of the most poverty-stricken places in the world, and recently Covid has prevented children there from accessing their education. Fred Hyde Day is therefore a significant day for our school, a day where our compassion and sense of justice is at the forefront of our thoughts. The day, including Marian's Got Talent, is definitely fun, but that's not why we do it. It gives us the space to reflect and to think with perspective. The greatest talent we get on stage is not the voice or the dance moves, but the courage shown by many of the contestants. It's a day that is not about us, but about other people. We are all part of the Marian College community and we are all part of a larger picture. Thinking with perspective, I'm grateful. Despite Covid. Despite lockdowns. We are some of the lucky ones. I am grateful to be a part of the Marian community, especially on Fred Hyde Day.


Girls In STEM Program review by Lia Hayward

Access Melbourne for 2022- guaranteed entry

Students who have experienced disadvantage can qualify for the Access Melbourne program by completing a Special Consideration (SEAS) application via VTAC.

Applicants who qualify under SEAS in the following categories will be guaranteed entry into courses with lower ATARs, providing they meet course prerequisites and preference the courses via VTAC correctly.

- Resident of a rural or isolated area
- Disadvantaged financial background
- Disability or medical condition
- Recognition as an Indigenous Australian

Access MelbourneExpansion

The University is excited to announce an expansion of our Access Melbourne program and admissions criteria in 2022.

This program extension builds on the University's commitment to building a vibrant, diverse and inclusive community and increasing opportunities for capable students from all backgrounds.

This year, in addition to ATAR, we will be assessing further criteria to welcome students from diverse and disadvantaged backgrounds into their preferred University of Melbourne course.

Current Year 12 applicants will be considered for selection if they satisfy the following eligibility criteria:

Eligible for at least one of the following Access Melbourne categories:

- Disadvantaged financial background
- Difficult circumstances
- Resident of a rural or isolated area
- Disability or medical condition

AND

Achieve an ATAR (or notional ATAR) of at least:

- 72.00 for the Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Design or Bachelor of Science
- 86.00 for the Bachelor of Biomedicine
- 8o.oo for the Bachelor of Commerce

AND

Achieve a VCE study score (or equivalent) of at least 35 in at least one VCE subject (or equivalent) that is relevant to the degree for which admission is sought.

AND

Submit a VTAC personal statement that outlines their:

- motivation to enrol at the University
- career ambitions and the future benefits for their community from their participation in higher education.

Applicants who meet the above criteria will not be guaranteed entry, but will be considered for selection (in addition to those who qualify for entry under other Access Melbourne categories).
