The prayer above is a reminder that the term is rapidly moving on, and change is a necessary part of any organisation following genuine reflection, discussion and discernment. I thank staff for their engagement in our Review process, and for the tremendous work in preparation for Subject Selection and a new Timetable for 2023. Following our Review period spanning the last nine months, there will be a number of changes to the 2023 Timetable.

Timetable:

The College moves to five, one-hour periods a day, with increased time in the areas of Literacy and Numeracy. This will be a substantial change for students and staff as we move forward. The breaks during the day will change with the larger break around 11.00am and a smaller break about 1.30. We know there may be some teething issues as we adjust to the new times, but the intention is to ensure we are maximizing the best learning opportunities earlier in the day by reducing the final session to one period.

Assessment and Reporting:

The Assessment and Reporting processes have been reviewed, highlighting some areas for celebration and other areas for future improvement, especially in the areas of timely communications through the Parent Access Module (PAM) to all parents. One area of challenge for many students and staff is finding the right balance between the quantity or breadth of assessment tasks currently in the curriculum, and the depth of learning and skill development, especially in the Literacy and Numeracy areas. All Faculty Heads are working with their staff on evaluating the guality and value of the current tasks for each year level. We know that the junior school covers an incredible number of subjects, creating some elements of stress for students. It is also important that our Reporting is current and informative for parents. Where feasible and effective, we have reduced the number of subjects each

Semester in Years 7-9, and will rotate electives.

Wellbeing and Support:

Following our review of Behaviour Management and Learning, we know that the frequency of referrals to the Responsible Thinking Classroom (RTP) for students are not necessarily indicative of poorer outcomes. Some students, while not necessarily disruptive, are tending to avoid working to their full potential. There can be many reasons for this, including health/mental matters or wellbeing matters, or lack of motivation for other reasons. Our plan is to develop further intervention processes and supports for all students to identify and support early. Further details regarding some new intervention approaches and support will be detailed later this year.

Position of Leadership:

The forth review area focused on enhancing greater staff collaboration across the College through changes to the current middle leadership organisational structure. Four Hubs will replace the current, somewhat separated Faculty arrangement, with Maths and Science working together, English and Humanities in a second Hub, the Practical areas of Physical Education, the Arts and Technology together, and Applied Learning. Every area will focus on Literacy for whole-school improvement. Again, these are significant changes, and we may see some teething issues that will need reflection and perhaps some adjustment to suit the best interest of the students in our care.

New Senior Leadership Position

Further to this, together with Kildare Ministries, I am interviewing for a new Head of Staff Development. The successful candidate will work with individuals, small groups, and all teachers: to further improve classroom practice, the effective use of data to inform instruction, self-reflective practices and professional development for teachers and other staff aligned to the College goals and needs.

Teacher Shortage and Changes for 2023



We are recruiting at this time for the start of 2023, for teachers in the areas of English/Humanities (especially to support our Tutoring and Intervention processes) and Learning Support Officers. We understand that there are many parents who have great skills in dealing with teenagers, and who have a passion for seeing students improve and thrive in their learning. If you feel you have a love of learning, patience and can support teenagers to learn, I ask that you contact the college if you are interested in a Learning Support Officer role. Part or full time employment can be negotiated.





HUMANITIES


