General Achievement Test

Students undertaking a Unit 3 and 4 VCE subject sat the General Achievement Test (GAT) on Wednesday together with all other VCE 3-4 students across the state. This test helps to moderate and provide valuable data for schools on the aptitude and applications of students before the VCE final exams in November. The General Achievement Test (GAT) is a test of general knowledge and skills including communication, mathematics, science and technology, the arts, humanities and social sciences taken by students in the course of completing their senior secondary studies. We wish all our senior students well as they begin their final term after the September break.

Child Safety Standards - Ministerial Order 1359

The new Child Safe Standards Ministerial Order 1359 came into effect on the first of July. While many things remain the same, equity, inclusion and diversity, and student voice have received greater emphasis. Each week in the newsletter we include some element of this order to ensure broad publication. If you would like further details, please access the College website/Policies or /Child Protection for further details.

Marian College is committed to providing a safe and nurturing environment for all children and young people.

The values and principles that guide the College in developing policies and procedures to create and maintain a safe school environment include:

- 1. Upholding the primacy of the safety and wellbeing of children and young people.
- 2. Empowering families, children and young people, staff and volunteers to understand, identify child safety matters, and have a voice and raise concerns.
- 3. Implementing rigorous ongoing and regular risk-management, training and employment practices.

Our Child Protection Program relates to all aspects of protecting children from abuse and establishes work systems, practices, policies and procedures to protect children from abuse.

Ministerial Order 1359 provides a framework for how Marian College will implement, monitor and evaluate the new Child Safe Standards.

For the purpose of all our child safety policies, programs and procedures, the College

environment is any physical or virtual place made available (including email and the College intranet systems) and other locations provided by the school for a child or young person's use. This includes school camps, sporting events, excursions, competition, musical productions, VET/VCAL programs, work experience placements, online learning environments and other events.

We all have a responsibility to ensure students are safe. It is crucial that students have a voice and know how to access help. At Marian College students have a number of pathways to support. Their Teacher Advisor is often the first point of contact. The House Leaders - Mrs Boatman, Mr Lloyd, Mrs McConachy and Mrs Spalding know students in their House well and can assist students, parents or families. The school psychologist and Head of Wellbeing are there to support also.

For any issue of child protection concern, students or parents should contact one of the Child Protection Officers (Ms Saravanja, Mrs Boatman or Mrs Emma Dawes) or contact DHHS or the police for advice. For other matters of concerns such as bullying or harassment and the like, students should complete an Incident Report in the RTC, send a Wellbeing referral (located on SIMON homepage, or see the Wellbeing team.

Update on COVID

From the 9th September, if you tested positive using a rapid antigen test, you must report your result to the Department of Health <u>online</u> (https://www.coronavirus.vic.gov.au/reportyour-rapid-antigen-test-result, or by calling 1800 675 398. You don't need to report your result if you tested positive from a PCR test. Your isolation period begins on the day you took your positive test.

How long your isolation period goes for depends on whether you have symptoms, which include a fever, sore throat, runny nose, cough or shortness of breath. Students should remain home while symptoms remain. Please let the college office know as soon as possible.







The tournament is part of Council's New Settlement Program aimed at attracting people from the communities of Burma to re-settle in our community.

What is Caneball (Chinlone - ခုံလိ)?

Chinlone or caneball originates from the communities of Burma and has been played for over 1500 years.

- It's heavily influenced by traditional martial arts and dance and includes hundreds of moves for maneuvering the ball. Typically six people play together as one team.
- It is played by individuals passing the ball among each other within a circle without using their hands.
- The point of the game is to keep the ball from hitting the ground while passing it back and forth as creatively as possible.
- Caneball is played by men, women and children, often together, interchangeable and is very fast, entertaining and fluid.
