Term Three has been a productive one, not least of which for the school's staff who have undertaken professional learning in several of the school's priority areas. Building staff capacity through quality professional learning is one way in which schools can better support the students in their care. Another example of the way in which Marian College promotes great outcomes is through the facilitation of collaboration amongst staff. All teaching staff have been engaged in enacting their individual Professional Learning Plans this term; one key component of which is the peer project. Peer projects are collaborative and involve small scale action inquiries into teachers' chosen areas of practice.

Some snapshots of other targeted professional learning undertaken across the school is included below. Such engagement is crucial to attaining and maintaining improved student outcomes. As with all new learnings and reflections on practice, growth and improvement can be attained when interventions are applied judiciously and with sensitivity to the school's context.

# Bullying Prevention with Robert Peroira.

Carmel Barker (Principal), Stephanie Saravanja (Assistant Principal, Head of Wellbeing) and House Leaders have completed professional learning with Robert Peroira, an educational consultant with a background of expertise in the area of bullying in schools. His approach is informed by the CBT (cognitive behaviour therapy) framework and Positive Psychology, and therefore complements existing wellbeing programs at Marian College, all of which centre on empowering the student. The team is in the process of operationalising key learnings and is doing so with immediate success.

### Quality Teaching (QT) Framework.

In August, Christine Bulger (CAL Learning Leader) and I were engaged in intensive training in the University of Newcastle's Quality Teaching (QT) Framework. The QT Model clearly articulates teaching that makes a difference for students. It comprehensively attends to matters of curriculum, student engagement, and equity within classroom and assessment practice. The Model centres on three specific dimensions of good teaching practice, each of which is comprised of eight rigorous elements. Both Christine and I are in the process of finalising our reflections on key learnings and potential applications.

### 'Creating an engaging and effective English Curriculum for Years 7 to 10' with Kirstin Bourne.

Our English staff have been taking part in a series of webinars designed to support teachers in the Diocese to share in best practice and to build student writing capacity. This pilot is being facilitated by Julia Petrov (DOBCEL) and delivered by highly respected Literacy Consultant, Kirstin Bourne. Christine Bulger and Emma Rusden have taken the lead at Marian in this pilot project; and they are supporting all relevant teaching staff to engage with Kirstin's principles in an authentic way.

# Improving Literacy in the Secondary Years Learning Area Leader Professional Learning Program.

Since the start of 2023, Paul McLoughlan (PEAT Hub Leader) and Megan Shea (PEAT Learning Leader), have been participating in the ILSY PLP for Learning Area Leaders from the domains of Technologies, The Arts, and Health and Physical Education (HaPE). CEB is partnering with

the University of Melbourne Graduate School of Education (MGSE)to deliver this initiative, the purpose of which is to build the capacity of teachers to explicitly and systematically lead sustainable improvement in student learning outcomes using a disciplinary literacy approach. On Friday 1 September, Paul and Megan presented their completed Action Learning Project to the entire ILSY LAL cohort and their efforts received commendation by the program's organisers. My congratulations go to Paul and Megan for their hard work and perseverance. I can say with confidence that the Marian College staff look forward to hearing directly from them on their learnings and key insiahts.

## ILSY Whole School Implementation Team

We continue our involvement in this highly impactful project, designed to build leadership capacity in schools by providing explicit instruction in developing and implementing a whole school literacy improvement framework. In Term Three, this has involved online workshops and coaching sessions with the MGSE's Dr Robert Sbaglia. I have been attending the workshops to progress plans for 2024, building on the brilliant work of Natalie Wirper (Literacy Coordinator), who returns from long service leave at the start of Term Four.

### EduTech 2023 August 24 & 25

At the invitation of the organisers of EduTech 2023, I was delighted to present as a panellist on the topic of 'Social Learning to build Collective Efficacy'. Given the scale and reach of EduTech, it was a special opportunity to speak on matters of such importance, as a representative of Marian CollegeArarat. Paul McLoughlan and Jesse Till (IT Manager) attended

4 the conference as delegates and were

enthused and inspired by new insights gained.

# Government House Victoria: A celebration of Science Education

And whilst it isn't professional learning per se, it was with recent great pleasure that both Susan MacPherson (STEM Hub Leader) and I received invitations from Her Excellency Professor the Honourable Margaret Gardner AC Governor of Victoria, to attend a celebration of Science Education, marking the 80<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Science Teachers Association of Victoria, We are both very much looking forward to attending the afternoon tea on Wednesday 20 September, along with approximately 100 other Science educators from across the state.

It isn't often that school leaders, teaching staff and support staff are recognised for their wider engagement with their profession and the learning that accompanies their professional roles. I trust that this provides valuable information to the school community at the conclusion of a very busy term. Further, I hopethat these snippets provide added inspiration to our students as their teachers model a shared commitment to lifelong learning with strength and gentleness, and with every student's wellbeing at the core.

Preparations are well underway for our students of Units 3 & 4 subjects who will be undertaking VCAA examinations. Conducted on Friday 8 September, the Elevate Education sessions for Years 10, 11 & 12 students were highly successful, providing invaluable revision tips and advice on study skills.

Please also note that the school has published to students, a practice examination timetable. The Practice Exams will take place during the school holidays under the supervision of subject teachers. Students are reminded that they are to wear school uniform (Summer option) and that they are to enter the venue (Brigidine Centre) via the back gate on Moore Street.

# IN MY WORDS with Joel Hoffman



I was born on August 28, 2005, at Flinders Hospital, South Australia, and lived just south of Adelaide in the seaside suburb of Christies Beach, only two blocks away from the water. That's right, I'm an S.A.lien, as well as my older sister Erin and younger brother Rhys; Zoey is the only one of us four born in Victoria. I've only seen the hospital I was born in once from the outside with my Mum pointing at the window of the room I was born in. I was born two weeks late and therefore was a lovely large plump baby boy, weighing in at 9lbs 5oz. My baby photo always resembled a Buddha praying or meditating in some way, so my mum frequently referred to me as a 'Buddha baby,' but I preferred 'baby Yoda' as I saw baby me as rather wrinkly and wise with his little hands crossed over. In retrospect, I should've trademarked that name.

Although living on a beach in a seaside suburb south of Adelaide sounds cool, I was only two or three years old when we moved to Victoria, so I don't have many memories there and didn't have time to develop my Baywatch abs and tan. We moved a lot during my childhood, bouncing back and forth between S.A. and Victoria.

I was raised on Star Wars, Batman, Spiderman, and all sorts of movies and cartoons in between in my youth. If I wasn't watching a movie, I was creating one with my siblings or with whatever toys I had at my disposal. I also enjoyed drawing little comic stories and picture books to show my pop. I loved creating all sorts of stories and fun games; my imagination was the limit. I remember patiently and meticulously making stop-motion animations and artworks, stressing over every detail, but it was worth it for the rewarding feelings of productivity and pride.

My experiences at Concongella were mostly good. Concongella was almost like a big family, and because of how few people there were, everybody felt unique. There were very few opportunities to blend in because there wasn't much to blend into; there weren't large enough groups to form any kind of clichés. So instead of forming clichés based

on wealth or social status, we formed gangs based on what 'tree club' we were loyal to. Enter the great Tree House wars. I can't even remember the way we distinguished the trees apart, whether they had names, or if we just said, "Hey! You're one of them, beyond the oval fence side dwellers, aren't you!" But I do remember how unstructured and shifty tree politics were.

I love animals; we had a pregnant stray black cat find comfort in our home at Christie's Beach. Shortly before I was born, she birthed a litter of kittens, one of which we gave to my Nan and Pa, and they named her Coco. We kept two ourselves, which we named Bella and Scruffy, as well as my mum's miniature foxy, Stanley, and dad's German shepherd, Dax. Sadly, both Dax and Stanley passed away, and Scruff only passed away a short while ago, while old Bella is still well and kicking, despite being the age of a human adult. I could go on to name every other animal we had in our care, more dogs, more cats, number of guinea pigs, a ferret named Han Solo because he looked like Indiana Jones, a rabbit named Gary, and a few more rabbits, horses, sheep, chooks, and alpacas, to a big pig named Martha. Some passed away, some are still with us, all with their own memories, personalities, and good times shared.

Everything leading up to now has given me a unique outlook and perspective, and I couldn't begin to show all the gratitude I have for my life and how meaningful each and every little experience is to me. I'd like to thank my Mum, Dad, and siblings for always being there, even if not by choice. My teachers for teaching and supporting me, the many creatures and critters that have kept me good company and brought me joy, and my friends in many places for taking the chance to befriend such a strange guy they don't know. Thank you all.

I can only hope that the future is just as exciting and fun as my life has been so far.




We are all very excited for Mr. Naus who will be getting married over the holidays. He is such a popular member of our House. We wish him and Joy all the best.


Remember that after the holidays all students must be in their Summer uniform. That also means our Marian College hat will be worn during breaks and PE classes.


















## BASKETBALL REPORT


