Peter Doherty Science Competition

Congratulations to Year 8 girls (**Eve Jones, Rhianne Guerrero and Lily Dunn)** on achieving first prize for the Peter Doherty Science Communication Award in Ballarat this week. This is a wonderful achievement for the girls who competed against students up to Year 10.

Established in 2009 as a joint initiative of the Committee for Ballarat and Australian Nobel Prize laureate Professor

Peter Doherty, the Peter Doherty award encourages:

- Scientific thought and activity, inspiring students to investigate everyday issues by undertaking experimental research using the scientific method.
- Scientific communication, requiring students to present their findings in scientific poster format and for finalists, at an in person presentation event. Well done on a great achievement!

No Phones in 2024 - Off-and-Away in Lockers

After some thought following a number of recent incidents of inappropriate use of phones or bullying, from the beginning of Term 1 (2024), phones will not be permitted from the first bell for TA in the morning until the final bell for the day. **Phones must be off and away in lockers.**

Students will not be permitted to use phones during the breaks as has been the practice up until now. While we understand this is not a perfect solution, it will provide clear expectations and directions for students, staff and parents.

This lead-in time between now and Term 1 provides students with an opportunity to ensure they have locks on their locker, and that they make other arrangements for payment at the canteen. Security and safety of the phone is a key issue and the sole responsibility of the student. Students will be sent to the office with their phone for a first breach of this rule. For any further breach, the phone will be removed for a longer period and parents contacted. We ask for your support in this matter as we move forward to protect all students from the power of social media and inappropriate use of technology onsite.

Peter Doherty Science Award Winners of the Communication Award 2023

The Peter Doherty Science Award is a competition for students from Year 7-10 to use creative science to investigate an everyday question. Students work in small groups to design and carry out an experiment using evidence based scientific methods. They present their findings as a formal scientific poster which is then assessed by the PDSA committee. The top 6 entrants are selected as finalists who then present their findings to a panel of 4 judges and audience. The panel, made up of science professionals and local community leaders, judged the presentation and then, combined with the poster, an overall winner was selected.

Marian College is incredibly proud to have a team selected as finalists for the 2023 Peter Doherty Science Award. The team of Year 8 students, Eve Jones, Lily Dunn and Rhianne Guerrero presented their report on "Does Eco-Friendly Cling Wrap Hold More Weight Than a Popular

Brand of Cling Wrap?' at the PDSA presentation evening on 23rd November at Ballarat Tech School.

Both their scientific report and oral presentation were outstanding and a credit to their hard work and dedication to this project. We are thrilled to announce that they won the Communication Award, which acknowledged their engaging and informative presentation. This is a particularly impressive achievement given they are only in Year 8.

The PDSA is one of many STEM opportunities available to students at Marian College. In 2024 we will continue to participate in activities designed to encourage and enhance students' skills and confidence in STEM subjects.




Outdoor Education Camps

Last week our class went on Outdoor Ed camp with teachers Mr Baker and Ms Wirper.

Day 1, Tuesday - Our class packed up the mini bus and a trailer and Mr Baker drove us up to Mt Stapylton campground. We arrived at the campsite and quickly unloaded and set up our swags/tents so we could then start our hike. From the campground we hiked up Mt Stapylton which took a couple of hours, once we were at the top we had lunch. We continued the loop back to the campground. We did a short walk to Ngamadjidj shelter and viewed the aboriginal rock art. Later we got out the trangias and cooked up some dinner then cleaned up. The sunset and stars were a highlight.

Day 2, Wednesday - we were woken up by the sound of Cockatoos and Kookaburras at 6.30am so we alI got up and cooked up some egg and bacon rolls for brekkie. They were nice to start the day, it was then around 8 and we had to pack up the bus again and leave Mt Stapylton to go to Halls Gap for rock climbing and abseiling. It was pretty good, I climbed to the top of all of the rock climbing sections. Most people got down the abseiling wall and it was a good view from the top. We then drove to a park and cooked lunch. After that we had to head back to school.

Thanks again to the teachers, camp was very enjoyable 8.5/10



10B Outdoor Education class planned their yummy camp meals and packed up tents and swags for our camp in northern Gariwerd (Grampians) on November 9th and 10th. We dropped off our gear at Stapylton Campground and prepped day packs for our hike of Mt Stapylton loop (nearly 14km). Within ten metres of leaving the camp, most students took a wrong turn and, heads-down, trudged off down the wrong track. It didn't take long for them to switch on and do a quick rush back, and everyone (mostly) paid attention to their directions and stopped at junctions for the rest of the day (except for when I forgot to tell Barb which way to go...). They've come a long way in their navigation since early in the term (they know what I mean). The scenery along the way was really stunning, with sweeping views of peaks, cliffs, amazing rocks, and the plains below. It was a hot day for hiking, so we made lots of stops for water. We found a huge, cool cave right near the summit of Mt Stapylton and had our lunch inside the shady cave, looking out at the vistas around us and visiting with the resident lizards.





Outdoor Education Camps

Everyone set up their tents and swags at camp before we took a quick stroll to the ancient rock art beside the campsite to remind ourselves how significant this area has been to Aboriginal Australians for thousands upon thousands of years. The group made a variety of delicious meals for dinner on the Trangia stoves, before clean-up, a bit of exploring, and our campfire with damper, marshmallows, and camp games. This group has such wonderful humour and energy, the only issue all camp was a few campers a bit too hyper to go to sleep!

After breakfast, pack-up, and ensuring that we had left zero traces of rubbish, we headed ten minutes down the road to Hollow Mountain to rock-climb and abseil at Summerday Valley. It was very hot, and only got hotter, especially out on the rock. The students are incredibly lucky to have had access to this site. Our climb guide, Earl, explained the sacred nature of this area and the reasons for leaving it as undisturbed as we found it, both to protect the natural environment and plant life, and to honour the Aboriginal stewardship and cultural sacredness of the area.

Each student tested and pushed their own boundaries, whether it be via the climb or the abseil, or both. Earl is the abseil whisperer, explaining the psychology of fear and mental barriers, ensuring that students felt secure and made the choice to proceed with the abseil. Students were incredibly supportive of each other, belaying and encouraging each other while rock-climbing, and building confidence in their peers through teamwork and leadership.

Too hot for lunch on the escarpment, we stopped in at Mt Zero picnic area to find some shade for lunch, before heading home. This was truly a group of capable little champions, especially considering that some had never camped before!
