The passing of Teresa Duffy (Tonks)



It was with heavy hearts that we announced to our students and staff the passing of Tess. Tess had been a tower of strength during her battle with cancer, and she will be remembered in part for the tremendous fight she showed during her long treatment. Tess will also be remembered for her fierce love for her children, Imogene and Gabe, and for the special bond they all shared. Tess was such an important part of our school community and she helped to infuse it with culture and a love of performance art that so many students have shared along with her. Her legacy will be felt here for years to come as someone with such life force makes a lasting difference in their time on earth.

Elevate Education

On Monday and Tuesday of last week, Elevate presenters spoke to our Year 7s, 8s, 10-12, students about how to manage time by sharing tips from top performing students, sportspeople and business people. They gave very useful tips to our students on how to break down assignments, how to do revision, how to prepare for exams and tests and how to manage study-related stress in the older year levels. Students in Year 7 and 8 were advised to set aside a two hour block each night for homework or revision. Some nights students may not need to use the allotted time but the time will be set aside for them when the assignments start rolling in. These students were also advised to spend 30 minutes a night (on nights when no homework was set) to read over their class notes for certain subjects and revise. This is essential to help students retain memory of information learned in class time. On nights when homework is set, the presenters advise students to cut back their revision time to 15 minutes. Obviously, as students progress through the Year levels into Years 9 and 10, the time set aside for homework and revision increases. The idea is to schedule in time each night to make organization and time management second nature.

PEER Support

Friday was the first session of Peer Support for our Year 7s and Year 11 leaders. We have 35 Year 11s taking up a position as Peer Leader and we are so lucky to have such a strong level of student support for our Year 7s. The first session was a getting to know you session with the focus being on positive connections. The focus for this Term is "Strengthening Connections" and carries a strong anti-bullying message. We do

not tolerate bullying and encourage all our students to follow a "live and let live" philosophy where we do not target those different to ourselves by ridiculing them - that is not the Brigidine way and we hope our Year 11s can be role models of acceptance and kindness to our 7s.

School Photos

A little reminder about school photos next week on Tuesday 22nd. Please wear your full school uniform and come freshly shaven, with hair tied back so you will be able to get your school photos taken. School photos are a special way to mark your time throughout school from a young tacker into adulthood and we love tracing the growth of our students this way. We are sure that parents feel the same way!

Wednesday 23rd, will be our swimming sports day. Even if you aren't a great swimmer, the day is lots of fun and participation is encouraged. Every person who participates wins points for their Houses and their efforts are celebrated by staff and students alike. For our talented swimmers, the day is about challenging themselves and doing their bit for their Houses. Overall, we expect a joyous and fun day!

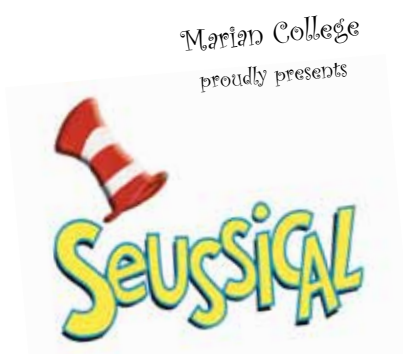
For Parents:

- You may pay by cash using the individual envelope provided.
Please enclose correct money as no change will be given.
- *Sibling photo envelopes are available at the school office upon request. **THESE PHOTOS WILL BE TAKEN DURING SCHOOL, ON PHOTO DAY, USUALLY AT RECESS***
 - Please instruct siblings to attend the photo studio during this time. Photographers are unable to search for students who do not attend.
- Do not seal envelopes inside each other. You may include payment for all children in one envelope, however, please indicate on this envelope the names of all the children you are paying for.
- All students should wear their **correct school uniform**.

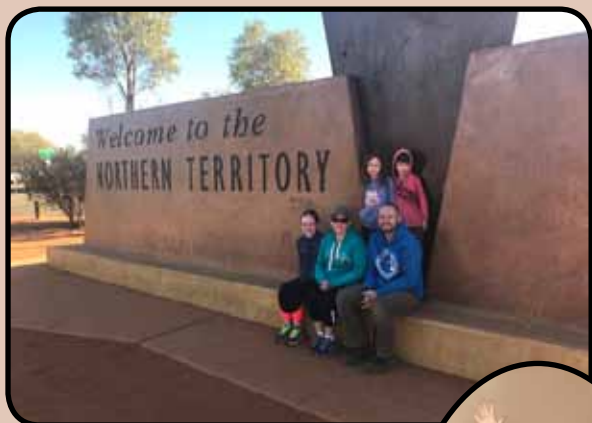

Moving to town was a whole different experience. Moving to a new school and being completely different from everyone wasn't really the best. With my little knowledge of making friends and limited vocabulary, I was basically the mute of the group. My childhood in Australia consisted





of me playing Minecraft, doing handstands on the walls, begging mum and dad to leave and singing the *Charlie and Lola* theme song. As a foreign child, I wanted to be friends with everybody. I spent years perfecting my English skills and trying to fit in with everybody. It did end up working out but slowly but surely I lost the skill to talk in my mother tongue. (Making things harder for me to socialise with the family back home).



Coming to Marian College, really lowered my expectations of my school life to turn out like *High School Musical*. But with making new friends and yummy canteen food, my high school experience wasn't so bad at all. I went through a lot of "experiences" throughout high school but it really helped me become the person I am today. As time goes on, things change.
