School Improvement Plan 2021

Over the last few months the College Leadership team and College staff have been preparing for an exciting year ahead with the return of many of the programs, initiatives and activities that underpin our theme for 2021 - "My best effort". This has been an opportunity to focus on and extend the important College priorities for 2021 after a challenging year of remote learning and COVID restrictions. We are very proud of the effort made by students throughout a difficult year. But our priorities are to continue to work hard to make Marian College even better. The following are our 2021 key priorities for improvement.

- 1. Improving literacy levels across the College.
- 2. Building teacher capacity in the use of student data to inform teaching and learning.
- 3. Developing a 'growth mindset' to learning improvement.
- 4. Developing leadership skills and opportunities to promote student voice and empowerment.
- 5. Consolidation of the Positive Education and Wellbeing programs and processes
 - to improve learning engagement.
- 6. Implementation of the new Kildare Ministries 'Living Justice Living Peace' Framework across the college.
- 7. Developing a broad understanding of our Year of Wonder

This year will have a strong focus on supporting students who need to catch up after remote learning with the introduction of the Tutoring Initiative while also supporting students who have thrived to continue to extend their learning. Extra Year 7 and Year 8 classes for Mathematics and English have been added to increase learning diversity, and opportunities for further advancement or extra support according to need. In addition to this, extra tutoring will focus initially on Year 9 and then develop to other year levels according to need. All teachers will monitor student progress and provide feedback on improvement strategies or intervention processes as the term develops. It is our intention for staff to work with students at all levels to improve their literacy levels in every subject.

Responsible Thinking Process (RTP)

For many students and parents new to the college in 2021, the Responsible Thinking Process is a new concept. One of the positives of the RTP is that it provides a very well documented, calm and respectful process for dealing with matters of classroom or yard difficulties for students. Sometimes a student may not be coping well in a classroom or the school yard for a variety of reasons. One of the important features for all students to understand is that there is a way to voice their concern when things may not be going well. The Responsible Thinking Classroom (RTC) is fully supervised by a staff member all day including lunchtime and morning tea time. This allows students an opportunity to complete an Incident Report to voice their concern and allow staff to follow through with investigating the matter. Students can speak to staff on duty in the room or their Teacher Advisor if they have any concerns. We often encourage them to bring along a friend for support if this helps. No student should feel unsafe at school. If parents are ever concerned about an issue we encourage you to speak with your child's Teacher Advisor. Most matters are dealt with easily and with discretion. There are avenues to escalate an issue if a matter is not easily resolved. Please let us know how we can help.

Year 11 and 12 Parent/Student Teacher Advisor Evening

We take on board a number of learnings from 2020, including providing a number of options to engage parents in productive conversations with the College. This year for our Year 11 and 12 night, we will offer either a phone interview with your son or daughter's Teacher Advisor, or an online booking through ZOOM. This worked well last year when there were few options during lockdowns. Meetings are planned for **Tuesday 16th March 2021** from 3.30 pm.

The purpose of these discussions is to provide an opportunity for parents, our senior students and their Teacher Advisor to discuss their current progress early in the year and to raise any concerns, issues or questions parents or students may have. This is a worthwhile opportunity for you to explore options for your son or daughter and the strategies for improvement or increased engagement as relevant.

Bookings for these conversations with the Teacher Advisor (TA) are available through the Parent Access Module on the College website. We look forward to continuing our shared role in supporting our students towards 'their best effort'.


