Help us live a Lent focused on freedom, generosity, and encounter. Give us hearts hungry to serve you and those who need what we have to give.

The Season of Lent

Last Wednesday we joined with St Mary's students for our Ash Wednesday's liturgy to begin our Lenten season. Thank you to Father Andrew for a very moving ceremony for both schools. As a child, Lent was the time to give up something we would enjoy, often lollies, for the six weeks before Easter Sunday. More recently, the notion of penance and preparation often are taken more broadly. Lent is also a time of reflection and meaningful actions in service to others, and to our world. How we look after our environment for future generations is sometimes giving up on a luxury that has wider negative implications, especially for poorer communities. At Marian College, the most vulnerable are at the front of our minds and in our hearts. Our focus in our Year of Courage is to speak

2023 - College Goals and Key Priorities

We continue to develop our whole school improvement plan in four key areas in 2023:

- 1. To improve literacy levels across the College.
- 2. To strengthen and extend intervention processes to address student performance gaps and opportunity gaps.
- 3. To complete a Master Plan to meet the needs of our unique community that explores existing and future learning spaces for flexibility, functionality, sustainability and

- cost efficiency for improvement in student performance growth, and to commence Stage 1 by the end of 2023.
- 4. To explore the themes of Justice and Peace locally and globally through the lens of courage.

Learning and Teaching

Now entering our fifth week for classes, all students should be well settled into classroom routines and study. Home study is intended to reinforce the day's learning and extend the student's ability to work independently. Teachers are working on the first Teacher Advisor round of reports. This is always a good indicator of early progress. It also highlights any early concerns so teachers and parents can work together to support improvement for all students. In addition to this, we have commenced a number of individual or small group programs to better meet the needs of students. If you have any early concerns as to your child's progress or wellbeing, please do not hesitate to contact your child's Teacher Advisor. An email is often the best way to communicate unless urgent.

Year 8 and Year 9 Camps

Term one is always a very busy term for camps. So far, the Year 12 have attended their Retreat at Cave Hill Creek while the Year 7 students spend three days getting

to know each other and Marian College a little better at Lorne. In two weeks the Year 8 students head to Camp Wilkin at Anglesea from the 15th to the 17th March. Camps are a compulsory part of the curriculum with costs covered by the College. Extensive time and effort go into planning and organisation to provide these extension opportunities for students. If for some reason there is an extenuating circumstance that will prevent a student attending, I ask that you discuss the matter privately with the relevant House Leader well prior to the event. Please note that no alternative program is possible during this time.

Year 9 Camp is from 29th to 31st March at Portland. Again, this is a compulsory part of the curriculum and all students are required to attend. Again, if extenuating circumstances exist I ask that you discuss matters with the House Leader early and well prior to the event.



















IN MY WORDS with Fraser Dunn Marian Vice Captain



Why do Work Experience?

Work Experience provides students with the valuable opportunity to:

- Develop employability skills
- Explore possible career options
- Understand employer expectations
- Increase their self-understanding, maturity, independence and self confidence.

Students are placed with employers primarily to observe and learn, not to undertake activities which require extensive training or expertise. Students are encouraged to organise their own work experience placement as soon as possible to avoid disappointment.

Work Experience in the Construction Industry

Occupations within the construction industry include: bricklaying, carpentry, demolition, electrical, engineering, excavating, joinery, landscaping, painting, plastering, plumbing, roofing, scaffolding and general labouring etc.

It is a mandatory legal requirement that any student undertaking Work Experience in the construction industry must obtain their 'White Card' (Construction Industry Induction Training) prior to attending their placement.
