Lent is the six week period leading up to Easter. It's one of the most important times of year for many Christians around the world. In the final week of this term, Year 12 students will present the Passion narrative 'Way of the Cross' just before we break for Easter. More details about times and location for this will be forwarded in the coming weeks.

School Improvement Plan 2022

Over the last few months the College Leadership team and College staff have been preparing for an exciting year ahead

with the return of many of the programs, initiatives and activities that underpin our theme for 2022 - "We are committed to Excellence". This has been an opportunity to focus on and extend the important College priorities for 2022 after a challenging two year of disruptions and COVID restrictions. We are very proud of the effort made by students throughout this difficult time. But our priorities are to continue to work hard to make Marian College even better. While not the only focus for the year ahead, the following are our two key priorities for improvement - 2022.

- 1. Improve literacy levels across the College.
- 2. Extend effective learning intervention processes and supports to improve student performance growth.

Staff have been working hard on evaluating current College practices and processes that directly impact student performance outcomes. Results of these investigations should be finalised late this term or early Term 2. It is important that as a College we continue to set high expectations for all students and staff, and remain focused on empowering our young people to challenge themself and reach their potential. This commitment is underpinned by the strong Kildare Ministries' mission, based on Gospel values, that guide our work.

Key to this improvement plan is an assessment of our learning spaces. Last year we employed a Master Planner to evaluate all key areas of the College including classroom spaces and outdoor areas for effective learning, wellbeing and safety for our students. The result was a comprehensive Master Plan spanning a number of stages for improvement over a period of approximately

ten years. What we do know about Master Plans is that they provide some key goal posts in comparison to other schools and contemporary learning needs. They also must be living a document that develops over time according to emerging or urgent needs.

For Stage One of this project, we are currently applying for a Capital Government Grant to replace the UH Wing and relocate the school library, upstairs in the heritage building, to a more central, more prominent and easily accessible location. Unfortunately, the UH Wing was flooded once again this Christmas despite works being carried out after the last flood.

The intention is to increase this new Resource Centre/ STEM Centre to provide greater flexible space to better support classes, individual students and tutoring opportunities for all students. In response to an assessment of our needs now and into the future, we have been working with staff, the Stewardship Committee and Kildare Ministries on planning processes for our submission early March.

Responsible Thinking Process (RTP)

For many students and parents new to the college in 2022, the Responsible Thinking Process is a new concept. One of the positives of the RTP is that it provides a very well documented, calm and respectful process for dealing with matters of classroom or yard difficulties for students. Sometimes a student may not be coping well in a classroom or the school yard for a variety of reasons. One of the important features for all students to understand is that there is a way to voice their concern when things may not be going well.

The Responsible Thinking Classroom (RTC) is fully supervised by a staff member all day including lunchtime and morning tea time. We are excited to welcome new to the College, Mr Paul Kelly, as our RTP staff member. Paul brings a wealth of experience working with teams and schools over his career. I am sure he will settle in well to this role.

RTP allows students an opportunity to complete an Incident Report to voice their concern and allow staff to follow through with investigating the matter. Students can speak to staff on duty in the room or their Teacher Advisor if they have any concerns. We often encourage them to bring along a friend for support if this helps. No student should

feel unsafe at school. If parents are ever concerned about an issue we encourage you to speak with your child's Teacher Advisor. Most matters are dealt with easily and with discretion. There are avenues to escalate an issue if a matter is not easily resolved. Please let us know how we can help.

This week our very excited Year 7 students visit Lorne for their Formation Camp to begin their Marian College journey. This camp is an important element in the transitioning of our students into the Marian Community. A very sincere thank you to Mrs Rhonda North and the many staff who will support the students throughout this week. Parents, please remember that students must wear a mask while travelling on buses, and any student who is unwell should remain home. We wish them all the best.

A huge thank you to all parents for your fabulous response in collecting students from the College on Friday or arranging suitable alternative means of transport. The funeral for Mrs Teresa Tonks was a beautiful tribute to her life. Many thanks to everyone for your support for the family and for the College.

Collection Notice for parents/guardians 2022 Student Residential Address and Other Information

The Australian Government Department of Education, Skills and Employment (the department) would like to notify you that a request has been made for your child's school to provide residential address and other information as required under the *Australian Education Regulation 2013*.

The school is required to provide the department with the following information about each student at the school:

- Names and residential addresses of student's parent(s) and/or guardian(s)
- Student residential address (excluding student names)
- Whether the student is a primary or secondary student (education level)
- Whether the student is boarding or a day student (boarding status).

The school collects the above information by generating a **unique and unidentifiable** – student reference number (SRN) for each student record. The SRN is also **only** used by the school for this collection. **It is not allowed to be used for any other purpose**. The number only indicates to the department that each record provided is for one student.

Purpose of the collection

The Student Residential Address and Other Information Collection (the Collection) informs Australian Government school education policy and helps ensure funding for non-government schools is based on need basis.

The information collected will be used to inform school funding calculations. It is combined with data held by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) to calculate a non-government school community's anticipated capacity to contribute to the costs of schooling.

From 2020, a new measure of capacity to contribute, the Direct Measure of Income (DMI), was introduced. The DMI is based on the median income of parents or guardians of students at a non-government school using data collected through the Collection. More information about the DMI can be found on the *Quality Schools*Package page on the departmental website.

Use and disclosure of personal information

Your personal information is protected by law under the *Privacy Act 1988* (Cth) (Privacy Act). Personal information is information or an opinion about an identifiable individual. Personal information includes an individual's name and contact details.

Any use or disclosure of your personal information must occur in accordance with Privacy Act and the *Australian Education Act 2013* and *Australian Education Regulation 2013*.

Your personal information provided to the department through the Collection may be:

- disclosed to the ABS for the purposes of capacity to contribute calculations and analysis as a part of the Multi-Agency Data Integration Project (MADIP). Further information about MADIP can be found on the MADIP page on the ABS website.
- disclosed to a contracted auditor where the department may from time to time, carry out an audit of
 a school's submission to the Collection. The contracted auditor compares the school's submission with
 the student enrolment information held by the school and will not use the information for any other
 purpose.
- disclosed to its service providers for the purposes of the provision of information and communications technology support services to the department.
- used or disclosed where it is otherwise required or authorised by law.

The department does not intend to disclose your personal information to any overseas recipients.

The department's privacy policy can be found at www.dese.gov.au and includes information on:

- how individuals can access and seek correction of the personal information held by the department;
- how complaints about potential breaches or breaches of the Privacy Act can be made;
- how the department will deal with these complaints.

The department commissioned an independent privacy impact assessment (PIA). The PIA assesses the flows of information under the Collection, compliance with the Privacy Act and measures in place to safeguard the personal information being collected. To my friends you all know who you are. Thank you so much for everything you have done for me. You all mean the absolute world to me and I appreciate you all more than you'll ever know. Keep being yourselves and never change for anyone. I can't wait to see you all grow into such amazing women and men and I can't wait to watch you all pursue your dreams.

There's one thing I would like to say to you all before I wrap this up. That one thing is never give up in life no matter what life throws at you. 

2021 Open Day Webinars
