












fed up and decided to come out at the least convenient time (Mum always tells me I "just couldn't wait") and so Dad had to deliver me in the back of the family car!

As David Bowie once said, "I don't know where I'm going from here, but I promise it won't be boring."




















FROM YOUR HOUSE LEADER

THE WAY OF THE CROSS 2021





The Stations of the Cross depict the final hours (the Passion) of Jesus' life from his condemnation, to his crucifixion and death on the cross and finally his burial. These events are remembered and reflected upon over Lent and Holy Week before the celebration of the Resurrection (Easter Sunday).

Our school celebration of the Stations of the Cross follows a tradition that is thousands of years old and is an integral part of Marian's religious identity.

At Marian, we believe that our practice of Stations

- Celebrates and promotes our Catholic Identity
- Provides an opportunity for the wider community to see Catholic Education in action
- Is, for many of our students, their only connection to the traditional Easter Story.

This year the Year 12 cohort has elected to present this retelling at the Ararat Astor Cinema on Thursday 1st April. To accommodate the large number of students and to ensure that it remains a solemn occasion we will run sessions for each Year Level.

Due to COVID restrictions Marian College is unable to invite members of the public to our Way of the Cross celebration. We hope to be able to provide a video link to families.

VCE DRAMA EXCURSION

On Wednesday, March 10 the VCE Drama class made a trip to Melbourne to view Top Class, part of the VCAA Season of Excellence programme. Top Class 2020 is a selection of the A+ Solo performance by students from across Victoria during 2020. Drama is a highly demanding subject for students as they are asked to devise, rehearse, edit and present a 7 minute solo performance to examiners in October. This exam is worth 35% of their final grade (25% is from the written exam and the rest from course work). One of the challenges of this task is that the students are required to research and write a script that is entertaining, relevant and sophisticated. Their performance of this piece must appear polished and effortless. I am happy to say that we have had a number of Marian students present their work at Top Class over the years and each one can vouch for the effort, energy and heartbreak that is involved in this task.

The students were treated to twelve outstanding performances at the Victorian Arts Centre and it was such a thrill to be back in the Theatre and to listen to the uproarious cheers from the predominantly

student audience. I could sense the awe and admiration of our students during each delivery and I could see their creative minds ticking and ideas blossoming. I am never silent about the many disadvantages our students face in completing their VCE and I am so very pleased that this year we got to witness this exemplary work and set the bar high for our young thespians and writers.

To finish off our day, we attended the inspirational and delightfully clever production "Come From Away". I selected this show for our VCE Drama class as the performers require exceptional characterisation, storytelling and stagecraft, but also must employ stunning skills in transformation, physical theatre, song and dance. This is a high energy and fast paced show that demands commitment, focus and discipline from the ensemble of 12 and they did not fail to deliver. A truly uplifting experience for all and although we all returned home a little weary, I am sure I speak for us all in saying it was worth it.

SLAVE FREE EASTER 2021


Once again the Justice League (J&D and Vinnies) will be holding a "FAIR TRADE" Easter raffle to promote fairness and justice in our world.

Tickets are 50¢ for one or 3 for \$1.00. Many yummy prizes to be won. Proceeds will go to Project Compassion.

Each day we will also hold a quiz with some yummy fairtrade chocolate prizes. (Starts 17/3)

This year we ask that you take a moment to check that your eggs and chocolates are fair trade - look for the logos below.

What is Fair Trade?: Fair Trade is a social movement that seeks to promote better equity for farmers in developing countries. Farmers get together and form a collective so that they have more resources, education and power. This results in better trade agreements with international countries, a better program for sustainability and better wages for their goods. These goods are often crops including but not limited to cocoa, coffee, cotton, bananas, tea and a host of other products made with a combination of materials for the consumer market. Receiving a fair wage for your goods allows farmers to pay decent wages to those working on the farm. The movement is growing every year!















BE A GOOD EGG THIS EASTER

Children as young as 12 years old are picking cocoa in West Africa to make the chocolate we eat. Some of these children are trafficked. Most are forced to pick cocoa from an early age for minimal or no wages, for long hours, in dangerous working conditions, without any possibility of attending school. Most of these children have never tasted chocolate and they never will.

Chocolate eaters around the world have made a difference already. A decade ago, slavery-free chocolate was hard to find in our shops.

Some successes are:

- ALDI stock a wide range of UTZ certified Easter chocolate.
- Cadbury dairy milk chocolate bars made in Australia have been certified Fairtrade.
- All Mars bars made in Australia are now certified RAINFOREST ALLIANCE
- All Nestle chocolate made in Australia and New Zealand is now UTZ certified.
- Haighs source 70% of their cocoa from UTZ certified farms. Their Easter range is 100% certified.
- For more information about slavery-free chocolate landmarks, the slavery-free certification program, the need for a living wage for cocoa farmers and the treatment of children in chocolate production, read A Matter of Taste.

What You Can Do?

- Join with millions of people around the world who now buy and eat only slaveryfree chocolate. To buy slavery-free Easter chocolate look for any of these certification labels on the wrappers: FAIRTRADE, Rainforest Alliance and UTZ.
- Talk about slavery-free chocolate tell five friends or family members about slavery-free chocolate.
- Use the Parish and School Bulletin notices to invite others in your community to join the Slavery-free Easter campaign.
- Pick your favourite chocolate Easter Egg. Find out if it is slavery-free chocolate.
- If it is not slavery free chocolate, then write to the manufacturer i.e. Lindt,
 Cadbury etc and ask them when they plan to make the product using cocoa certified to be slavery free.
- If your favourite chocolate is slavery-free write to the manufacturer and congratulate them on what they are doing towards the reduction of child slavery in West Africa.
- Visit your local supermarket or café (if they stock chocolate) and congratulate them. Also ask them to commit to doubling the amount of slavery-free chocolate they stock next Easter.
- Consider getting a hamper together to raise money for Caritas Australia's Lenten Project Compassion appeal. Create awareness by asking people to contribute only slavery-free chocolate to the hamper. If you are making up the hamper let people know that all the chocolate is slavery-free. This is a great way of spreading the word.

Year 12 – University Pathway Planner

If you're planning to apply for university courses this year, there are many dates, programs and initiatives you will need to be aware of.

These dates and initiatives will vary between states. Having a diary or a planning app on your phone or device will help you to feel organised and ensure you don't miss any key dates.

If you are wondering what you could be doing during Term 1 to get prepared for the application period, please check out some suggestions.

TERM 1

Have a career appointment

Book in an appointment with your career appointment to explore any course/career/occupation goals you may have.

They will be able to give you advice specific to the state you would like to study in, the best courses to suit your goals and also suggest other options you may not have considered yet.

Don't have any course goals or career interests? No worries! They will be able to assist you to identify interest areas that align with your values, skills, academic aptitude, and personal competencies.

Participate in career events

It's never too early to attend career events. You will be able to explore course options, ask questions and speak with course advisers. Many events will be held online this year which will help if you can't travel.

Undertake work experience

Talk to your career adviser about undertaking work experience during the Term break

Speak to past students

Ask your career adviser if they can link you with a past student who is studying or working in the area you are passionate about. You and your parent/guardian may be able to Zoom with them and ask them questions.

Book a consultation

Several universities offer a one-to-one chat service via Zoom. Ask your career adviser about how to book in for an appointment.
