But here, at the airport, they have a job to do and they have the astounding ability to direct people to an issue so that it may be dealt with accordingly. Last week, our community was overwhelmed with shock and grief as we learnt of the loss of one of our year 12 students, Sophia Van Opstal. At the moment we are feeling the rawness that comes with grief, the confused sadness and anger that we will struggle to comprehend. It is ugly.

But let us not turn away from it, lest we turn from the beauty that shone through Sophia in the gentleness of her very being.

I happened to be in the Chapel on Thursday, when a Year 12 student who was in there, asked if I would say a prayer with her. In an example of misplaced professionalism I endeavoured to keep a stoic facade as I entered the prayer, thinking that by keeping it reasonably formulaic I would be able to find the words and keep my emotions at bay.

The Spirit doesn't work like that.

Once the heart felt that it was being tapped, the words opened up and the facade was dropped. It was an opportunity to name these feelings, to interact with our emotions, to be free of restraints, to remove our hearts of stone and allow the Spirit to flow and ask God to welcome Sophia with open arms of compassion, to ask Mother Mary to give us strength, and to ask Jesus to give us the courage to walk together upon this road with Him.

This is a terrible time, but let us not forego the opportunity to remember all of the good that Sophia brought to us all. She will be dearly missed and never forgotten and my love and prayers go to all of our Year 12s and all who have had the great privilege of meeting Sophia during her time with us.

May God bless and keep her always.



Maths Methods & Physics News




The VCE Methods, Specialist and Physics students went to Melbourne to take part in the VicPhysics Luna Park Day.

VCE is about having an explanatory understanding of a concept. Students grow up using terms like speed, weight, fast, slow, far but often not necessarily scientifically accurate. Scientific literacy requires students to have the language to explain phenomena. This trip was about giving students similar experiences that we will refer to when learning concepts in Motion and Calculus.

Advice to Parents


