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# From the Principal's Office

What an extraordinary term! As we head into the June break on Friday, I am sure many of our students are experiencing some level of increased fatigue. The winter months are normally more challenging but this term has been something we could not have anticipated. Saturation by negative media stories from across the world certainly have not eased stress levels. We have moved from stories about the virus to mass protests, riots and now violence. While underpinning many of the recent actions are very worthy causes, the positive stories - the calls for calm, the rational voices, and the examples of community unity, and the positive things in our life can be lost in the process.

Despite the best efforts of staff and parents to buffer some of the media saturation and pressures of a rapidly changing scene, we are seeing some increase in stress and fatigue. This may manifest in behaviours that suggest an increased sensitivity to comments and over-reactions to trivial or mundane matters, anger, tears or impatience. For our young people much has been asked of them over the last two months. As adults, often we recognise signs of stress in ourself and adjust our life patterns accordingly wherever possible. We know that things happen in cycles and that eventually difficult times will make way for better days ahead. We look for the positives, the things for which we are grateful, the people we love, and things that make life meaningful.

For students, it is important that over the break they engage in the fun side of life again, whether that is sport, meeting friends or family activities and rituals. They need to take a brain break from study and the media for a time and re-charge the batteries. Students do enjoy family time. I wish all families a safe and happy holiday break.

## Increased Junior English and Maths Classes

As we move forward on-site once again, it is important that we continue to work towards our key College goals. At the beginning of 2020, we increased support in the junior English classes at Years 7 and 8 to better support differentiated learning and our ability to supplement or advance

students according to need. This term, a similar program will be introduced for the Mathematics department at Year 8 level. Year 7 Mathematics students are working closely with the Mathspace program to identify learning needs, and steps for support or advancement. It is important to understand that a number of classes are scheduled at the same time to be intentionally flexible. Students may move in and out of a class appropriate to their need in a particular skill. The extra staff will enable our teachers to work closely together, to better know all students, and to monitor and adjust individual learning programs across the cohort.

## VCE 2020 Results Release

Advice was received late last week that the Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) and Victorian Certificate of Applied Learning (VCAL) results will be released to students at 7.00am on Wednesday 30th December 2020. Students who have applied for an Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) will receive it on the same date. This timing will enable students to receive their results, access courses and career counselling, and adjust their preferences, if required, prior to the first round of offers from the Victorian tertiary institutions.

Details about how we can best support all students at this time and provide any information about career options and choices, knowing it will be in the time period between Christmas and New Year, will be forwarded early next term. Senior staff will work with the Year 12s early next term to assist students understand the process, to discuss best options with staff, institutions, careers counsellors and parents, and to help students complete preferences online. ## Final Day of Term

At the end of this very busy term, I would like to personally thank all parents, students and staff for the incredible work we have achieved together.

This Friday 26th June is the final day of term. While we are unable to celebrate House Day in a similar way to previous years at this time, our student leaders have suggested students dress in their favourite sports colours or as their favourite sports person. Individually wrapped lunches will be provided on the day in line with good COVID19 hygiene practices. School ends at 2.15 pm. Rural buses will arrive early to meet students.

## School Uniform and Expectations

It has been an extraordinary term for us all. Throughout this period new routines and expectations were necessary for a swift, smooth transition to remote learning and then return once again to school.

From Term 3, all students will be expected to be in Full School Uniform according to our dress code and phones must be Off and Away. Phones, earplugs and music are not permitted in class. They must be Off and Away in lockers.

For Years 7 and 8 and other students who have purchased the new uniform, this uniform must be worn in full. For Term 2 and Term 3, the long winter pants are required. Girls may choose between the winter skirt or long pants. Students are not permitted to wear shorts with the formal uniform for Term 2 and 3. There is time ahead over the break for all students to see to this before we return. Any parents who are experiencing financial difficulties with the purchase of items at this time are asked to contact the College Business Manager.

The older uniform rules have not changed. We are now into the winter months. We have a number of second hand items available for students in the last year of school who do not want to purchase items new.

# IN MY WORDS *with Alexandra Fraser*

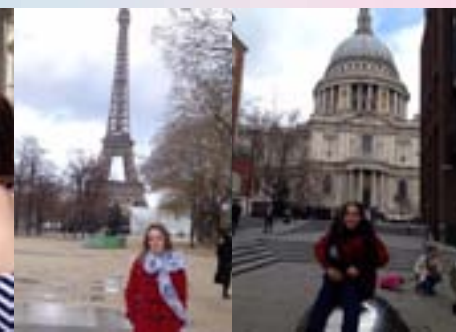
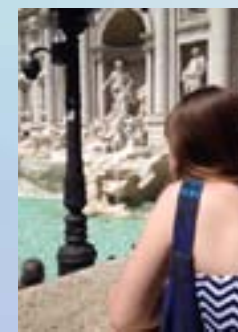

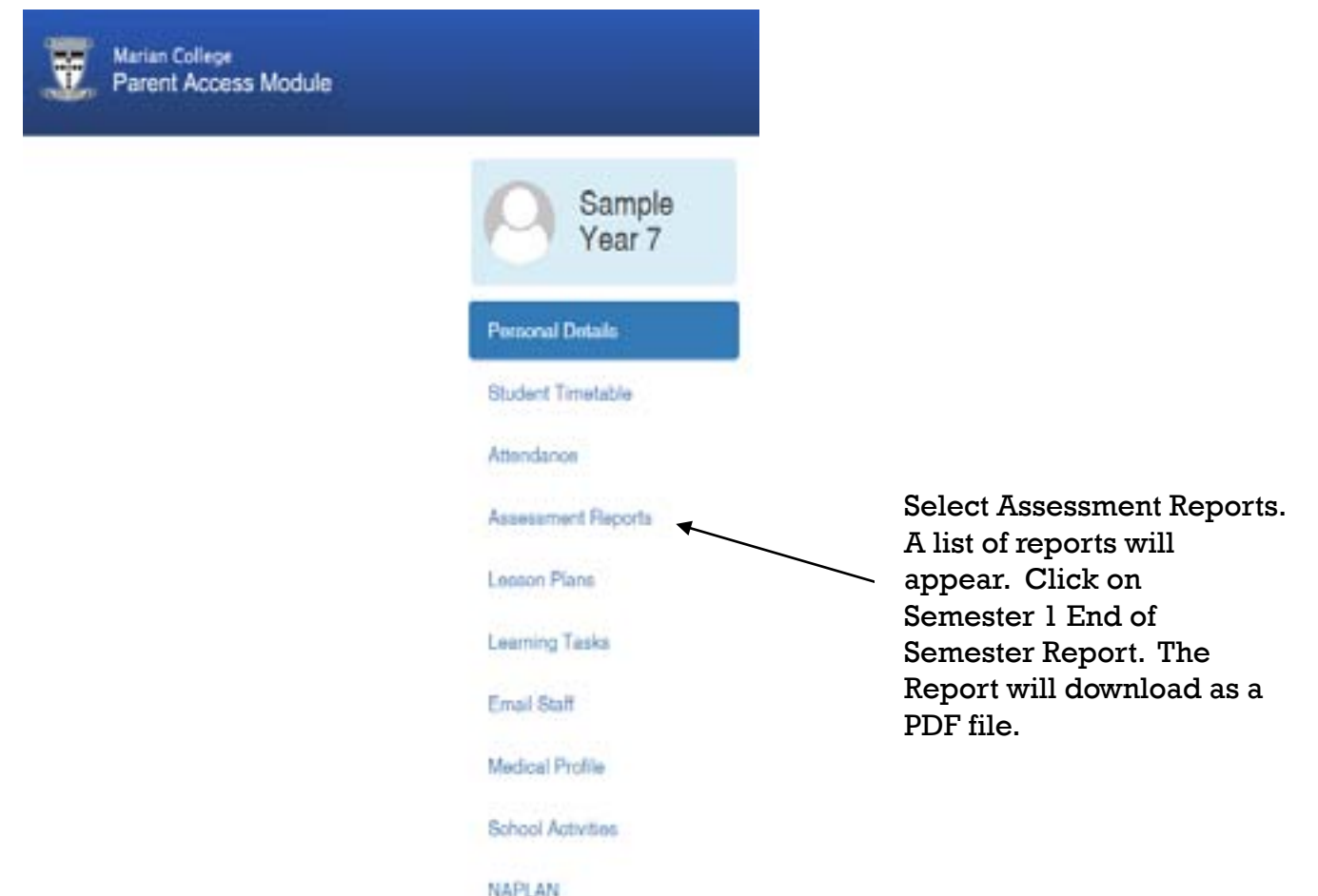

You will still need to complete year 12 and meet subject prerequisites, but in the words of Swinburne, *'this isn't an easy way out, it's a determined person's way forward'*.

How do I apply?

**Step 1:** check that your course is eligible and that you meet the subject prerequisites.

**Step 2:** ask your school to fill out the recommendation form. Your school will make an assessment based on your past results and capacity for tertiary study.

**Step 3:** In August / September, add your course/s to your VTAC preference list. Your career adviser will talk to you about the order of courses on your list.

If your school agrees to recommend you and if you achieve a minimum English study score of 20, meet other subject prerequisites and complete year 12, you will receive a guaranteed offer.
