



Dear Parents, Carers, Friends and Students of Marian College,

 - We strive for continuous improvement

Being still is hard, especially in our fastpaced society with its demands of instant results and constant busyness. When our students returned from remote learning late last term, they were overjoyed to see each other face-to-face. Being still and isolated was hard. For those in Melbourne at this time, there is a stillness in the air where social distancing and 'lock down' have created stilted conversations, avoidance, and quick departures from the company of others. While this is very difficult for all families and many businesses, we understand it is for our protection and for the safety of others more vulnerable in our community.

But, despite the many difficulties and very sad stories that continue still, (and I would not want to understate the impact of these on families), there have been some positives to emerge from this time. We have found new and creative ways of bringing people together. Our students and staff have spoken about the joys of having more time with loved ones during this period. We have had more silent time to think about the things that are most important to us without the stress of an overcrowded agenda and the rush to be somewhere. This does not mean it has not been stressful or busy but it has been a new busy. Limited to our area, I have had time to travel more in the Grampians on weekends and appreciate some quiet time in the hills. I think we all need this at times. Even Jesus had to get away from the crowds in order to find quiet.

"Be still, and know that I am God! (Psalm 46:10). Things will eventually return to some form of normal for our schools and communities, but hopefully family life and the much needed moments of silence to reflect on the things that are most important to us remain part of the new. Faith, understanding and prayer are important part of our College. In the silence we remember those who have been most impacted at this time:

We pray that those living with fear of disease will find a sense of calm in the shelter in Christ. For countries where health infrastructure is limited, we pray that they will be granted equipment and resources. We pray for the healthcare workers especially for those at the forefront of the coronavirus outbreak. And, we pray especially for the generous sharing between nations during the coronavirus.

2021 Enrolments

As we emerge into the new term, our enrolments for 2021 are tracking well with many ZOOM interviews now completed. Staff enjoy this time of meeting our very excited Year 6 students for this first of many times. At this stage, onsite tours have been delayed until later this term pending the easing of

some COVID restrictions. We understand that together with Induction Days, these tours form an important part of our College welcome. They further help new students ease well into secondary college. We look forward to meeting all new students later this year when we can enjoy this time together. Mrs Rhonda North (Transition Corodinator) will forward details of important dates and procedures in the next few weeks.

Subject Selection

This year, the Subject Selection processes for the 2021 school year will take a new format. Faculty Leaders are currently finalising online resources, handbooks, powerpoints and videos to explain each area of study, options and opportunities for your child. It is important that parents and students are a part of this process. Teachers are there to guide, support, provide feedback and advice on current progress and level of difficult of a particular subject, and answer any questions. More details will be forwarded shortly with dates and details for deadlines.

Strategic Thinking and Planning 2020

We began this year with a key focus on further developing literacy levels across the College. We have increased teaching staff for both literacy (English) and numeracy (Mathematics) classes to better target support and extension needs. We have appointed Ms Natalie Wirper to the new Learning Diversity Leader who will work with Rose Rowe and Jenny Wilkinson (Learning Needs) and all Faculty Heads to oversee, implement and monitor learning adjustments, programs and processes for improvement. Teachers are working on High Impact Teaching Strategies (HITS) through their Professional Learning teams (PLTs) and sharing ideas, knowledge and resources. Mr Linc Barnes has been appointed to oversee this process. We know what teachers do make a difference. It is therefore vital that we continue to build teacher capacity, reflect, and evaluate students

learning and progress. Teacher Advisor Reports provide an opportunity to share this information with parents and the child. Our interviews allow us to work with students to evaluate their learning, address needs, and set new goals together. We begin this term with Round 1 of Semester 2. Please see the Parent Access Module (PAM) for assessment data, due dates, and reports. All Reports should include a result and written feedback for each subject.

In 2015 I started Year 7 at Marian College Ararat and I am very grateful for the education I have received at Marian College. Over the years I became best friends with this really weird kid named



I am a big believer of getting the basics right in order to set ourselves up to best approach each day.


The basics I refer to are as follows:



FAIR TRADE CHOCOLATE WRITING COMPETITION

Year 11/12 - Evie McMurtrie

Although most people have heard of the term Fair Trade and hold a vague understanding of the concept, many are unaware of the meaning of what Fair Trade actually is. Fair Trade is where non for profit organisations aim to bring a better standard of living for poor farmers in developing countries. Fair Trade promotes stable prices and decent working conditions to help and empower workers around the world to create their own sustainable livelihoods through reliable employment. Too often, the world has been ignorant of the situations existing in other countries where women, children and men placed in vulnerable positions are subject to harms like poverty, abuse, neglect, exploitation and violence. Fair Trade attempts to stand against this through supporting marginalised farmers and workers, enabling them to build a better and more secure life for themselves. their co-workers and their families. As a Global community, we also need to help contribute to communities who are in need by supporting the fair trade movement. Little things such as checking the labels on items and making sure we are purchasing fair trade products can make a major difference to the lives of people who are less fortunate than us. Let's begin now so in 20 years time, no children will be born into a terrible life of poverty and may receive the right to having a decent education and prospective future.

Year 9/10 - Gabriel Tonks

The practice of Fair Trade makes sure that cocoa labourers are paid properly and that the communities where the cocoa is grown are properly supported with children in school instead of up trees with chainsaws and machetes so that systematic poverty can be stopped at its roots. This means that these children will have bright futures with many opportunities. Currently children as young as 5 are lured away from their homes with the false promise of financial security for their families. The sad reality is that they are earning about 2 dollars a day to work long hours in incredibly dangerous conditions with little food and no breaks. Some children are known to haul 50kg bags of cocoa beans when they themselves weigh less than this. To add to this unfortunate situation, children have no time for education and so their career options dwindle to working in the cocoa plantations for the rest of their lives. The benefits of Fair Trade Organisations are that minimum wage and work conditions are required in order to use the Fair Trade or UTZ logos. These work conditions include no underaged or forced labour, environmental sustainability, quality control of produce and the maintenance of healthy communities. Parents earn enough money for their families so that their kids do not have to work and instead go to school to improve employment options. Cooperatives are established so that the community directly benefits from sales of the beans. The future of chocolate production is assured because of this. Further to this, we as consumers have peace of mind and know that we have the power to make powerful and influential changes to how big businesses conduct themselves.

Year 7/8 - Bridie Giles

Fair Trade International was officially established in 1992, however Fair Trade was first founded in the United States in 1946. This came about when America began to trade with Puerto Rico and support their poor communities and buy their special craft.

Large powerful companies who usually produced chocolate, coffee and cotton, were responsible for treating their workers unfairly. Many of the workers are poor and unprotected. So the project began by supporting workers and their families as many only make around two or three cents a day. Which is not nearly enough to eat, for a comfortable house and to send their children to school. It is important to support such an organization as it protects vulnerable people who have been exploited, these are the types of people World Vision support, such as Tesefaye. Tesefaye was a struggling coffee farmer, who did not make enough money to support his wife and children. But since World Vision started working with him, Tesfaye and other farmers in his community have had the training and have now been through development programs and are able to increase the income they receive from the sale of their coffee. But there are still many people out there that are still in need of desperate help, most of these people are children. These kids are put to work early, as their parents need the extra money. The children working at these factories are exposed to the danger of working at such a young age, these children also miss out on most and if not all their schooling. These wealthy companies use their power and money to mistreat vulnerable people, who cannot speak for themselves. Fair Trade has exposed this injustice and are now more accountable for their actions. So please if you can, try and buy products with the Fair Trade logo and together we can fight for a fair and just society.
